Types of Social Movements



What is the target of the movement? What amount of change do they seek?

<u>Alternative Social Movements</u> – Individual – Alter some behavior **EPEX**. Temperance ends battery

<u>Redemptive Social Movements</u> – Individual –Total Change Ex. EPFundamental Christianity "New Creation"

<u>Reformative Social Movements</u> –Society – Specific behavior Ex. EPCivil Rights Treatment of Minorities Types of Social Movements

Transformative - Societal Total Change -Seek to transform the social order itself with their version of a good society. Revolutions - French, American

Transformative Social Movements – Total -Transform Epsocial order itself Ex. American Revolution

Transnational Social Movements – Global Change – improving the quality of life Ex. Women's Rights


Metaformative Social Movements – Change global Social order – Rare – Reformulate practices of Race, gender etc.
